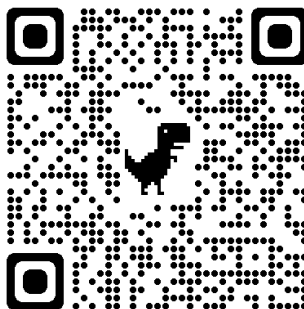
Denver is a compassionate city ~ Now let's keep it safe and clean

What we can do to end urban camping in our neighborhoods

1. Be safe; Walk in groups; Do not confront campers; Call 911 if you find yourself in a threatening situation.
2. If you witness a crime or medical emergency call 911
3. Report encampments: The more times camps are reported, the quicker the city responds.
 - a. Report using PocketGov: <https://www.denvergov.org/pocketgov/#/report-a-problem>
 - i. Include photos, if possible in your upload to PocketGov
 - b. Email photos to Save and Clean Denver: safeandcleanphotos@gmail.com
4. Fence off areas where you do not want encampments
 - a. Some neighbors have experienced success by fencing off tree lawns with orange safety fencing, others have replaced grass with river rock.
5. Get to know your City Council Person
 - a. List of City Council Members:

 - b. Send an email or schedule a meeting to discuss your concerns with the rapid growth of urban camping in Denver
6. Get to know your local Police District Community Resource Officers (CROS)
 - a. To find your District Station go to denvergov.org and search for District Station
 - b. Email them with your concerns
7. Contact the Mayor's Office with your concerns
 - a. 720-865-9000 or use the online contact form:

8. Speak at Denver City Council Meetings, which are typically held every Monday and start at 5:00
 - a. The sign-up is every Friday at noon for the following Monday and is on a first-come, first-serve basis. Typically, 7-8 people are called to speak. These time slots fill up fast so be ready to sign-up at noon on Friday.
 - b. You are given 3 minutes to speak and can speak in-person or via a zoom call. The zoom call is easy; type out what you want to say before the meeting and then read it when they call on you. Have a specific point you want to make and follow it with a specific request of the council.
